EXECUTIVELY SPEAKING

Wow! Another exciting Region 2 conference has come and gone. This year Birmingham, AL became the site for a weekend of wondrous panel discussions and glorious charity auction activity for seven members of the DaVinci crew. I suppose ya'll are asking yourselves at this time what kind of goodies did I sweep away with for my "trek-collection?" I'll never tell, but I will say that the "spicy" item of the charity auction was a Hamilton 3-D Gold/Platinum chess set that made another collector (not me) quite happy. Now, here's this month's update on transporter technology.

TRANSPORTER OPERATIONS: Transporters were used by most space faring civilizations for short-range transport of personnel or equipment. The main advantages of this form of transport were twofold. On a planetary scale small vehicles or spacecraft were no longer needed to go from one place to another; someone who lived in San Francisco, CA could beam to Paris in the morning and be home for dinner at the end of the day. Traveling by transporter was almost instantaneous; when beaming from Paris at 16:30 hours one would be home in San Francisco a few seconds later. The sense of time while transporting was almost non-existent. Compare this to 21st century travel when it took roughly 10 to 12 hours to travel from Paris to San Francisco by airplane.

In general a Transporter Chief was responsible for the operational readiness of a transporter. He or she performed the actual "beaming" and made sure everything was done according to protocol. Although a transporter chief was present in a transporter room it did not mean that beaming could only take place from within that room. In the 24th

century a request for transport could be made via every computer terminal on a starship. Furthermore an emergency transporter armband could be used to remotely activate a transporter and it was also possible to use a com badge for the same purpose. Remote activation of a transporter was only done in case of an emergency or when the crew of a vessel was not onboard, like when the crew of a runabout was on an away mission.

When the workings of a transporter were in doubt it was the job of the transporter chief to investigate the problem and correct it. This could mean that every transporter aboard a starship, or station for that matter, needed to be taken offline to perform the necessary diagnostics.

A typical transporter sequence for the beam-down of a person began with a coordinate lock during which the destination was verified and programmed, via the targeting scanners. Next, the life form to be beamed was scanned on the quantum level using a molecular imaging scanner. At this point the Heisenberg compensators take into account the position and direction of all the sub-atomic particles composing the object or individual and create a map of the physical structure being disassembled. Simultaneously, the object is converted into transmittable information, or matter stream - the person being beamed is now converted into billions of kilo quads of data; one atom out of place and he or she is never to return.

The matter stream is then transmitted between locations through the system. As with any type of transmission or radiation, scattering or degradation of the signal is to be expected. This process is counter-acted by the addition of an annular confinement beam (ACB) which is essential in maintaining the integrity of the information contained in the beam. The matter stream is briefly stored in a pattern buffer while the system compensates for Doppler shift to the destination and then transmitted through an emitter pad. Finally, the initial process and the object or individual is reassembled at the destination. A person being transported could freely move around, although it was advisable not to move too much while in transport.

Ms. J. Ryburn, also known as Savage Lucy 42, loves banana frappes and has been a Star Trek fan since the age of four. This 22 year old college student studies Toy Design, collects the Art Asylum Star Trek action figures, and, when not attending a comic con dressed as an Orion slave girl, finds time to write and illustrate original fan fiction. She was raised on The Next Generation but has a love for the original Star Trek series. "There's just something really charming and retro about TOS's style that I really like," she says.

Though she claims to be a "closet Trekkie" Ms. Ryburn's love for Star Trek is obvious once the fan girl within has been coaxed out of hiding. She adores tribbles and feels that there should be a special tribble DVD featuring all episodes involving those furry creatures available to fans. "There's something silly about the visual of thousands of furry little brown balls stuck all over the Enterprise's walls." She also loves the feature film Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan and her favorite Star Trek quote is "What IS it with you?" which McCoy asks Kirk after that notorious individual beds a blue woman in Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country.

Ms. Ryburn has only recently begun writing Star Trek fan fiction, though the ideas she puts into her stories have been in the back of her mind for some time. Her fanfics are set in the Star Trek universe, but the characters she writes about are her own creations. She states that "...people are a little more accepting of my writing since it's my characters and anything I have them do no one can say how out of

character it is. They're my puppets and they dance however I tell them to." Her creation, the USS Foreigner and her crew, is a combination of TOS and TNG, and the stories are set sometime between those two Star Trek series. The tales themselves are highly amusing if a little sardonic. "...Foreigner is a little bit of a sarcastic and ironic look at Trek, let no one forget that every part of it is my love letter to Star Trek in one way or another."

Some of the main characters featured in Ms. Ryburn's stories are Captain Ford Hudson, the android DD-9D7, Dr. Moriska Ulanivitch, Chief Engineer Tricia Scott, Chief of Security Bo Melac, and a rather paranoid Andorian by the name of "Dead Meat" Thurgidson. There are more supporting characters, each with their own particular idiosyncrasies. When asked which of her original characters was her favorite, Ms. Ryburn had this to say: "It's a tie between Captain Hudson's lecherous adventures with green ladies and [DD-9D7]...he's still a little wacky and gifted with backhanded compliments."

In addition to writing original Star Trek fan fiction, Ms. Ryburn also illustrates her stories. Her artistic style is immediately recognizable to her fans and possesses a certain charm that makes it well suited to her stories.

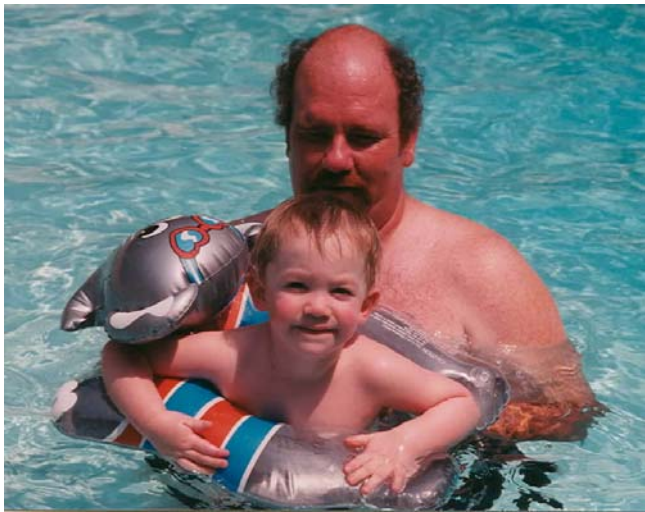
